Deregulation	 The Board of Registration of Hazardous Waste Site Cleanup Professionals ("the Board") is proposing to amend its regulations at 309 CMR 1.00-9.00 to: Update the continuing education credit requirements for Hazardous Waste Site Cleanup 			
	Professionals (often referred to as "LSPs") including lowering the total number of credits LSPs need to renew their licenses every three years from 48 to 36 and reducing the required number of credits in MassDEP courses from 12 to 9; simplifying the categories of credits needed to renew; and allowing credits earned outside a renewal period to count toward an LSP's next renewal in some situations. The Board recognizes that that LSPs have found acquiring 48 total credits and 12 MassDEP credits every three years to be challenging and the Board believes the proposed 36 total credits and 9 MassDEP credits are sufficient to allow LSPs to stay current with technical and regulatory updates relevant to the LSP profession. The reducing of the total credits to 36 also brings the number of credits needed to renew (i.e., effectively 12 credits per year) in line with the amount needed for both the Connecticut Licensed Environmental Professional Program and the New Jersey Licensed Site Remedial Professional Program, the two state programs similar to the Massachusetts LSP program. The Board also believes simplifying the categories of needed credits to renew will make renewal easier without lessening the requirement for LSPs to stay current with technical and regulatory updates, and believes allowing some credits earned outside a renewal period to count toward an LSP's next renewal will incentivize LSPs to take courses they find interesting when they are offered.			
	• Update the requirements for continuing education courses to reflect that many courses are now offered online rather than in person and to formalize additional requirements for those courses such as requirements for attendees to answer polling questions or pass an assessment of learning to ensure LSPs are present and engaged when taking online courses;

The amendments also reflect that, with the recent introduction of an online portal, applicants and LSPs can submit documents and pay fees electronically and the Board can also issue notices to applicants and LSPs electronically, all of which has made the program run more smoothly.
